The October 1st meeting was held at the Marin Builders Association in San Rafael

1. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The meeting was called to order at 12:06 pm by Charles Lucas, which was followed by the pledge of allegiance.

2. <u>SELF INTRODUCTIONS (Officers, Guests, Members)</u>

There were 24 members and guests in attendance.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES -

A motion to approve the minutes was made by Alex Daddow and Jay Bradford seconded, all approved, no opposed.

4. OFFICERS REPORTS

President: Charles Lucas – Charles mentioned that the officers met last week on October 23rd to go over the agenda and discuss education opportunities, scheduling next year's meetings, ICC Chapter Education Benefit use, etc.

Vice President: Jay Bradford - No report.

Treasurer: Steve Buffenbarger- Checking account report for the month of October:

Checking beginning balance: \$26,310.43

Deposits: \$737.61 – membership dues and lunch, seminar income, interest. Debits and Checks: \$1,077.65 – seminar costs, members and officers lunch,

scholarship, website, and accounting fees. Checking ending balance: \$25,970.39

Secretary: David Willoughby – Verified that the October bank statement is consistent and accurate with the Treasure's upcoming monthly report.

Past President: Tony Piazza – No report.

5. LIAISON REPORTS

AIARE: No Report

CSI: Christian Holbrook: Christian was not present, so Alex Daddow gave the report. Next meeting is the 1st Thursday of the month, November 7th at 5:30 - 8:30 pm dinner meeting at Charlie's Grill at the Windsor Golf Club. The new member orientation begins at 5:00 pm. The program is on opportunities for members and board members and chapter goals for the coming year with question and answer session. The holiday party is scheduled for December 5th.

SCFPO: Glenn Schainblatt: Glenn mentioned that the youth center fire program was completed and successful, 6 troubled youth went through the program, it was a 2 day event and the SCFPO is looking at continuing the program next year. Also talked about the new code adoption.

ICC: Chris Ochoa: Chris mentioned that he attended the annual ICC Conference and code hearings in Las Vegas, and it was successful. The board of director election resulted in the two CA candidates (Randy Metz, fire fighter from Carlsbad and Nancy Springer, Building Official from Sacramento County) cancelled each other out and were not elected. Jay Elbetter's term ended as past president and now only have one CA resident, Stuart Tom in office. ICC has now partnered with an IT company to provide Chapter website design and maintenance. ICC has offered for all 380 Chapters nationwide to pay all the startup costs, absorb most of the maintenance fees. Chapters will work directly with the IT company in Southern CA on website design and maintenance. The cost will be a nominal \$50 / month. The board came out with the 2025 Vision Plan and is online if you are interested. CBOAC: Glenn Schainblatt: Glen stated that they are moving forward with the annual conference and business meeting at Morro Bay on May 3rd to 7th. The program will consist of State and agency updates, FEMA presentations, a wine cave tour, etc. should receive a sponsorship request from CBOAC.

CALBO: Brad Wungluck: Not present. Chris Ochoa mentioned that ICC and CALBO sponsored a booth at the conference in Las Vegas. CALBO is busy with preparing for Ed Week training in Burlingame coming up December 16 – 19th. New legislation will be busy after Thanksgiving.

CEC: Amie Brousseau: Amie mentioned that she brought a new employee, Elmer Mortel, with her to the meeting in order to help learn the ropes. In October the CEC approved the 2 Res. Hers Providers, CalCerts and Cheers. Non-Res to come later. Sponsored a workshop in October on the 2022 Code and still available for comment until November. New Blueprints letter came out in October. Working on new smart forms for the 2019 Non-Res.

IAEI: Doug Hughes: Doug mentioned that the Installation dinner will be held in December in San Francisco this year. On November 20th is the Free NFPA 70 training (includes a free electrical code) to go over the Electric Code changes, this training is for AHJ's only. December 5th and 6th is a training on the residential and commercial provisions of the Electrical Code that incorporates the 2019 changes.

BayREN: Carolyn Glanton: Carolyn turned the report over to Christine Condon, who works in the Energy and Sustainability Division of Sonoma County and is the new BayREN rep. Cristine reported that there is a forum on Energy Storage in San Leandro on Thursday, November 14th (also available on a webinar). The 2019 code trainings will be ready by the end of November, Russ King will be available to provide 1-hour trainings at jurisdictions on both Res and Non-Res code changes, and BayREN will provide lunch. Schedule with Christine. Working with the CEC and Energy Code Ace to provide training on the 2019 Energy Code coming up in November and December. ICC Region 1: Glenn Schainblatt: Glenn Schainblatt and Chris Ochoa mentioned that the meeting was combined with the ICC ABM in Las Vegas and the election of officers also took place.

6. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Education Committee: Glenn Schainblatt mentioned that there is a CASp training put on by the Yosemite Chapter on this Friday, November 8th; coming up on November 20th is the NFPA class on the 2019 CEC updates (free code book for AHJ's only); a 2 day electrical residential and commercial inspection class by Mike Stone on December 5th and 6th (2019 CEC); working with BayREN to get an energy class perhaps next month; and the CA Fire Chiefs Association and NorCal FPO are putting on a 3 day training, February 4 – 6 in Santa Rosa at the North Coast Builders Exchange, on the 2019 CBC and CFC updates and means of egress. All of these trainings can be found on the REACO website on the Home page or in the Calendar of Events at https://www.reacoicc.org/.

Web-Site Committee: Charles brought up he thought there were some missing documents on the website, I will follow up and see what the issue is. All the officers are pitching in to add content, update, and maintain the website. Make sure you get your annual dues paid before the meeting in order to receive a free lunch in December.

Audit Committee: no report

Nominations Committee: Past Presidents present at the meeting comprise the committee (Tony Piazza, Doug Hughes, Glenn Schainblatt, and Eric Seabrook) – There are 2 nominations, Steve Neely Permit Intake Manager from Santa Rosa and Kevin Scheumann Inspector from Petaluma. Michael Enright asked for clarification on what is the officer succession and method of nomination/election. Charles Lucas read the Bylaws which reads as follows "Article III Section 3: Term of office. The President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer, shall take office at the annual business meeting and shall serve until the succeeding annual business meeting. No officer, other than the Treasurer, shall serve for more than two consecutive terms in the same office. Section 4: Manner of Election. 1. The nomination of officers for the ensuing year shall be done prior to the last regular meeting in each calendar year. 2. Election of officers shall be done by majority vote of all members in good standing present at the last regular meeting in each calendar year. 3. Voting shall be by open or secret ballot as determined by the President. In the event of a tie vote for any office, voting on that office shall continue until a determination is made. Section 5: Installation of Officers. Officers shall be installed at the meeting at which they are elected and immediately following the tabulation of the results of the election." Any one can be nominated

and elected as an officer, but past practice is that there is a succession of being nominated and elected as the Secretary and continuing up through the ranks of Vice President, President, and then Past President. Elections will occur on the December 3rd meeting. Steve Buffenbarger thanked both Steve and Keven for being willing to serve on the board and make that commitment.

7. PROGRAM

No program today.

8. CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Charles mentioned that CSI was planning on putting on a code forum with Building Officials and others. Alex Daddow said that the meeting has been postponed and will hopefully be put on sometime in early 2020. Carolyn Glanton said that she is now on the CSI board. Jay mentioned that RERA was also interested in putting on a code forum and wondered if there would be interest from CSI to work together on this, Carolyn sounded like there would be interest in that, Jay will put a contact from RERA in touch with CSI. Charles mentioned that there was some correspondence from Evan Giarta and Nele Maas from the Electric Power Research Institute asking if REACO would be interested in supporting a proposal to develop an Energy Storage Guidebook for the CEC. Amie Brousseau would see what she could find out about the company and program. Victor mentioned that American Public Works Association is having their annual conference starting November 6th – 7th in the City of Richmond, can go online to APWA NorCal and see who speakers are, \$50/day fee.

Please bring raffle items to the next meeting on December 3rd to be given away to all lucky members that are present at the meeting.

9. **NEW BUSINESS**

Doug asked for a donation to the IAEI Northern Chapter to help offset costs for putting on the upcoming electrical training in Petaluma on November 20th. NFPA and IAEI are hosting the event and it is free. Doug asked for \$300 to help offset lunch costs. Glenn Schainblatt made a motion to donate \$300 to IAEI Northern Chapter for offsetting costs for the November 20th electrical class, 2nd by Daryl Phillips, all in favor, no oppose. Steve Buffenbarger asked for an email request for the donation. Michael Enright said that the City of Santa Rosa City Council has postponed the code adoption and will be given 2 energy options - 1. Reach Codes all electric and 2. Electricity favored (not sure what this entails). Steve Buffenbarger stated that Healdsburg will be going forward with the almost electric which is all electric except for the cooktop and fireplaces for new construction (cooktops and fireplaces can be gas). Daryl Phillips said that Marin County adopted an energy code that incentivizes all electric by increasing the energy compliance margin by a certain amount. The new energy code changed from a percentage above to EDR. The City of Larkspur is going with Tier 1 without energy for all new and substantial remodels. Doug Hughes said that Petaluma is going with Tier 2 with energy or if you choose to go all electric then reduced to Tier 1 with energy. Michael Enright mentioned that the CEC did a cost recovery study that showed a 3-year cost recovery in 2010, now it is a 30-year cost recovery in 2019. Daryl Phillips wanted to know if anyone has a current ordinance regarding backup generators? Will it be considered an emergency-based equipment (not subject to the noise ordinances)? Doug Hughes said that the City of Petaluma looks at permanently installed generators the same as mechanical equipment with regards to placement in the yard. Michael Enright stated that the City of Santa Rosa just uses a handout they provide stating you will comply with the City noise ordinance - basically an advisory. Too much push back when only allowing generators that meet or show how comply with (demonstrate) they comply with the noise ordinance. Jay Bradford said that in one case the propose generator was creating 75 dba and that according to consultants the generator would need to be placed 25' away from the property line and have a sound dampening device like a Zombie Box. The BO for San Rafael, Don Jepson is in the process of drafting a noise ordinance including an emergency period to deal with noise/fire. Jay also asked the members if they had received correspondence regarding the definition of Multi-family with regards to 11A and 11B. This was a DSA letter.

No items brought forward.
