The December 3rd meeting was held at Cattleman's in Petaluma

1. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The meeting was called to order at 12:09 pm by Charles Lucas, which was followed by the pledge of allegiance.

2. <u>SELF INTRODUCTIONS (Officers, Guests, Members)</u>

There were 29 members and guests in attendance.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES -

A motion to approve the minutes was made by Mike Enright and Doug Hughes seconded, all approved, no opposed.

4. OFFICERS REPORTS

President: Charles Lucas – No report, the officers did not meet this month.

Vice President: Jay Bradford - Thanked Charles for his year of service

Secretary: David Willoughby – Verified that the November bank statement is consistent and accurate with the Treasure's upcoming monthly report.

Treasurer: Steve Buffenbarger- Checking account report for the month of October:

5. LIAISON REPORTS

AIARE: No Report

CSI: Christian Holbrook: Christian and Alex Daddow were not present. No report.

SCFPO: Glenn Schainblatt: Devin Gambonini from Petaluma Fire and SCFPO gave the report and said that most of the jurisdictions are wrapping up their ordinances for the upcoming new code adoption. 2 new legislations coming up are AB 178 which gives exceptions for various requirements to victims of recent wildfires. AB 38 is the second and will require enforcement of the fire safety clearance in Very High Fire Severity Zones within the SRA and LRA areas within 120 days of home sales. Next meeting is December 18th and will be the end of the year luncheon. Officer installation will be in January.

ICC: Chris Ochoa: Chris mentioned that the online governmental consensus voting deadline is coming up this week. Something that came out of the conference in Las Vegas is a new ICC App for the phone and a 2020 – 2025 ICC Vision Plan that you can look at on the website. CBSC has several openings they are trying to fill.

CBOAC: Glenn Schainblatt: Glen stated that they are moving forward with the annual conference and business meeting at Morro Bay on May 3rd to 7th. The program will consist of State and agency updates, FEMA has committed to a 4-hour presentation (flood plain managers will get credit for the class). You can make reservations online for the conference. Eric Seabrook made a motion to sponsor the CBOAC ABM this year at the Premiere level for a cost of \$1,000, Jay Bradford seconded and all approved, no opposed. Sponsorship at the Premiere level enables a free registration for the ABM, also included is free advertisement of REACO logo on the CBOAC website and conference material. We will determine who will use the free registration at a future meeting.

CALBO: Brad Wungluck: Not present. Chris Ochoa mentioned that Ed Week training in Burlingame coming up December 16th – 19th.

CEC: Amie Brousseau: Amie mentioned that they are busy getting all the forms ready for the new code. She will be at the CALBO Ed Week in Burlingame this month. Mike Enright asked about the Code Adoption process for the CEC and Amie said it is a public process and can take 2 to 3 months to complete. Once the CEC gives its approval Steve Buffenbarger asked if they will notify the CBSC or does the local jurisdiction need to notify the CBSC. Amie said she was not sure but would check on.

IAEI: Doug Hughes: Doug mentioned that the free Electrical Code (NFPA 70) held November 20th in Petaluma was a success and had a good turnout, about 75 people. On January 29th Northern California IAEI Chapter officers Installation banquet will be held in South San Francisco this year. December 5th and 6th is a training on the residential and commercial provisions of the Electrical Code that incorporates the 2019 changes.

BayREN: Carolyn Glanton: Christine Condon reported they are coordinating with the education committee to get trainings scheduled on the new codes which will start happening in January. The BayREN trainings will be in Cloverdale and Santa Rosa. Also, working with Energy Code Ace to get full day trainings. Mike Enright mentioned that there are energy code trainings offered thru PG&E as well. Martin Dodd is the instructor in many cases and is very good. Glenn Schainblatt mentioned that Sonoma Clean Power is also offering help to jurisdictions. Doug Hughes mentioned that storage battery system requirements are available at the Sustainable Energy Action Committee (SEAC) website. Eric Seabrook made a motion to make Glenn an honorary member of REACO in perpetuity, Doug Hughes seconded the motion. Jay checked the Bylaws and there was no requirement to retire before being made an honorary member. A vote was made, all in favor and no opposed. Glenn expressed his appreciation of the organization and all those who have served with him.

Online voting on Group B code proposals ends at midnight, Pacific Time, on Friday, December 6

The Online Governmental Consensus Vote (OGCV) is now open, which means this is your opportunity to vote and have your voice be heard on the codes we use. All validated voters are urged to log into cdpACCESS and vote on all the codes. The code development process needs all of your voices to be heard on these proposals. The OGCV closes at 12 midnight Pacific Time on December 6, 2019. David Spencer, CBO, building official for Chelan County, Wash., and International Code Council Board Director speaks to the importance of the voting process and how to get involved with cdpACCESS. "You should look at the things that are important to you, your jurisdiction, even your chapter and make the appropriate votes through cdpACCESS."

Michelle Britt, Code Council's Director of Energy Programs, takes on questions about 2018 IECC

The Building Safety Journal recently featured a Question/Answer article about the International Energy Conservation Code, provided by Michelle Britt, Director of Energy Programs. The column we addresses typical questions asked of the Code Council's technical support team. As always, code opinions issued by International Code Council staff are based on published Code Council codes and do not include local, state or federal codes; policies; or amendments. Click to read the column. The IECC is also the subject of another white paper, titled "The Important Role of Energy Codes in Achieving Resilience." The document follows another white paper issued in October, titled "Resilience Contributions of the International Building Code." The conclusion defines the value of energy codes to communities and building owners: "From their initial creation through today, building energy codes have played a major role in reducing the impacts of adverse events. Before, during and after disasters building energy codes influence both individual and community capacity to withstand and bounce back from such events. As policymakers consider approaches that enhance resilience, energy codes should be a cornerstone."

FEMA issues 2019 National Preparedness Report highlights enforcement of most up-to-date codes
The just published National Preparedness Report highlights successes and challenges across <u>FEMA</u>'s five
mission areas, including the Agency's assessment that: "Many states and territories still have outdated
building codes despite evidence that updating and enforcing codes lead to mitigation-related savings."
The Report goes on to note that "upfront investments in stronger buildings can help communities save
money and recover more quickly when disasters strike." The report covers the diverse range of disaster
preparedness challenges, from terrorism and active shooter incidents, to cyber attacks, to natural
disasters, as well as how stakeholders across the nation are using preparedness grant funding to invest

U.S. House of Representatives passes bill requiring disaster recovery funds adhere to latest codes The U.S. House of Representatives recently passed the Reforming Disaster Recovery Act (H.R. 3702), requiring that new construction and rehabilitation funded through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant disaster recovery program (CDBG-DR) adhere to the latest building codes. The International Code Council worked closely with House leadership on the bill. The CDBG-DR program provides flexible funding to states and local governments to address unmet recovery needs related to housing, infrastructure and economic revitalization, focusing assistance toward low- and moderate-income communities. CDBG-DR is the largest postdisaster recovery program not operated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Congress provided \$35.4 billion for the program in response to the damage caused by Hurricanes Maria, Irma and Harvey. Studies consistently show that adopting and applying up to date codes is one of the most effective mitigation measures a community can undertake, but according to FEMA, two-thirds of communities facing hazard risk have not adopted hazard resistant codes. This means that the safety and resilience requirements for federally supported reconstruction investments currently varies considerably. The Reforming Disaster Recovery Act addresses this challenge by establishing minimum standards for post-disaster rebuilding, ensuring all communities and their residents are provided with the same protections regardless of where they are located. The bill couples the code requirement with additional funding to train building officials, fire officials and the construction industry on the latest building codes. Click to read more.

House subcommittees hear testimony to reauthorize National Windstorm Impact Reduction Program Just now, the U.S. House of Representatives' Subcommittees on Research and Technology and Environment held a hearing on the National Windstorm Impact Reduction Program (NWIRP). The purpose of the program is to measurably reduce the loss of life and property from windstorms through an improved understanding of risks and impact. Ryan Colker, the Code Council's Vice President of Innovation and Executive Director of the Alliance for National and Community Resilience (ANCR), testified about the importance of reauthorizing this program with enough funding and longevity to meet its goals. Other witnesses included Dr. Scott Weaver, Director of the National Windstorm Impact Reduction Program at NIST; Major General Lee Tafanelli, Kansas Adjutant General, Director of Kansas Homeland Security, and Director of Kansas Emergency Management; and Dr. Delong Zuo, Associate Professor of Civil Engineering at National Wind Institute of Texas Tech University. 8 Performance Method

8.1 Overview

This chapter explains the performance method of complying with the *2019 Building Energy Efficiency Standards* (Energy Standards). The method works by calculating an Energy Design Rating (EDR). The EDR is a score from 0 to 100, where 0 represents a building that has zero net energy consumption based on the time-dependent valuation ((TDV) energy consumption and 100 represents a building that is minimally compliant with the 2006 International Energy Conservation Code. This is the same criteria for a score of 100 for the National Home Energy Rating System (NatHERS). Approved programs calculate an EDR for the building (proposed efficiency) and compare it to the energy budget (standard efficiency). Approved compliance programs also calculate an EDR for proposed photovoltaic (PV)/demand flexibility and compare it to standard PV/flexibility budget.

The standard efficiency includes water heating, space heating, space cooling, indoor air quality (IAQ) fan energy, and solar generation. Energy use from lighting, kitchen appliances, and washers/dryers is not eligible to be traded off.

The Energy Commission approved computer programs for compliance calculate space-conditioning and water-heating energy use in accordance with a set of rules. Modeling capabilities are in the *2019 Residential ACM Reference Manual* (ACM Reference Manual). All software programs use the same compliance generation tool (California simulation engine [CSE]) to simulate the energy use, and the same report generator to create the certificate of compliance (CF1R), as the public domain program CBECC-Res. Vendors of approved software have the flexibility to create their own user interface, user documentation, and additional forms.

This method provides maximum flexibility to trade off the energy performance of different building components to achieve compliance. Making a building more efficient will lower utility bills and improve comfort.

The performance method is the most popular compliance method allowing builders the flexibility to optimize performance at the lowest cost. Each approved program is required to have a compliance supplement with information on the use of the software as specified in the 2019 ACM Approval Manual.

A discussion of the performance method with additions and alterations is in Chapter 9.

8.2 What's New for 2019

8.2.1 Determining Compliance – Energy Design Rating (EDR)

The EDR has three components: 1. efficiency EDR, 2. PV/flexibility EDR, and 3. total EDR (also called final EDR). The efficiency EDR is based on the energy efficiency features of the building, including the envelope, HVAC, and hot water-heating features. The PV/flexibility EDR score captures the PV system, battery storage system, precooling strategy, and other demand responsive measures. The total EDR combines the efficiency EDR and PV/Flexibility EDR into a final score. The approved programs do not allow installing more PVs in exchange for less efficiency. However, if PVs are coupled with a battery storage system, a modest credit known as the self-utilization credit is available for tradeoff against

the efficiency features. Approved compliance programs allow installing more energy efficiency in exchange for a smaller PV system.

Compliance requires meeting two different criteria:

- Proposed efficiency EDR must be equal or less than standard efficiency EDR, and
- Total EDR (efficiency, PV, battery storage) must be equal or less than total standard EDR.

The efficiency EDR is the building's efficiency without any solar generation. The total EDR includes solar generation and any battery storage. This means the building must be energy efficient and it must generate enough energy to offset the electricity used to operate the building.

8.2.2 Major Changes Affecting Standard Efficiency

The standard design efficiency is based on prescriptive requirements. Two major changes to the standards are quality insulation installation (QII) and solar generation. Although not mandatory, performance compliance will be much more difficult to achieve without QII.

More information about the prescriptive solar electric generation Chapter 7 of this manual or the ACM Reference Manual.

8.2.3 New HERS Verification Requirements

Heat pumps will require verification of their capacity. Because the capacity affects the use of electric resistance back-up heating, a HERS Rater will verify the installed capacity meets or exceeds the capacities modeled for compliance. Software users can either enter the heat pump capacities (at both 47 and 17 degrees) or use an automatic sizing function. (Reference Appendix RA3.4.4.2.)

Whole house fans provide a significant compliance benefit in some climate zones. Software users will have three options, two of which require HERS Rater verification of airflow and watt draw: (1) specify a fan airflow, (2) select the default fan airflow required for prescriptive compliance with HERS verification, or (3) select the default fan airflow without HERS verification (the effectiveness of the whole house fan is derated by 7 percent). When verification is required, a HERS Rater will verify the watt draw and airflow rate. (Reference Appendix RA3.9.)

8.3 Compliance Basics

8.3.1 Compliance Process

Any approved computer program may be used to comply with the Energy Standards using the performance method. The following steps are an outline of the typical computer program procedure:

- 1. Collect all necessary data on each component.
 - a. For the building envelope, the area of each fenestration, wall, door, roof, ceiling and floor is needed. For each component, the applicable energy characteristics needs to be defined including U-factor, solar heat gain coefficients (SHGC), solar reflectance, and thermal mass values.
 - b. For HVAC systems, the type and efficiency of space conditioning equipment are required. For hydronic space heating, the specific water heater type and efficiency
